Benefits are available to most people who meet the financial and nonfinancial requirements, and the program serves a broad spectrum of low income people. In Fiscal Year 2015, SNAP provided about \$1.26 billion dollars in food benefits to a monthly average of 844,597 people in Missouri. The program served 86.2 percent of those eligible for benefits in Missouri in 2014. SNAP also has an economic multiplier effect; every dollar in new SNAP benefits results in \$1.80 in total economic activity.
